**Vacancy: The Session** was happy to receive further applications for the post of Minister at CCR when it met on Saturday 1st October. The next meeting of Session is to be held on Monday 24th October in the early evening to interview these applicants, and it is envisaged that preaching for the post will take place during November. **We pray that the Holy Spirit** may grant wisdom and right discernment to those who will be making decisions at this important time. and that God will graciously provide for us a suitable Minister to lead CCR forward into the future path God intends for this Congregation.

**PEOPLE - God's love for his people** is at the heart of the Gospel and the response of God's people to that love underlies the work of the Church. **We thank God** for the many ways in which God's people serve God through their unselfish service to this congregation and in support of its activities. **We thank all** those who contribute their time and energy to supporting the activities of the congregation, and **we thank God** for all we owe to those who served God here with loyalty and enthusiasm in the past.

We expect that **Olive Eaton** will soon move from St James's Hospital to a nursing home, and pray that her family may be guided in their search for suitable accommodation. **We sympathise with Jimmy Gibson** on the death of his sister Betty, a member of the Arklow congregation, and with **Bippany Chol** on the death of his mother. We hope that **Alice Gibson** soon gets over a problem with her recovery from her shoulder replacement. We note that **Ruth Whelan** will spend the autumn in Geneva as a Visiting Professor, where she will teach and investigate the correspondence between Reformed Christians there and French Protestants serving in the prison galleys about 1700. **We pray** that in every changing circumstance of life we may all feel the comfort of God's loving presence in our daily lives.

**Harvest Thanksgiving Service - Sunday 16th October** We will be decorating the church on **Friday 14th October** at 2 pm. All donations of greenery, flowers, fruit and tinned foods gratefully received. Lots of helpers needed so please come and help if you can.

**The Church Committee** met on 13th September and noted that repairs to the outside drains and the asphaltting of the car parks had been completed. Expenditure will be required in the Lecture Hall to update our provision of fire precautions. Proposals to improve the sound insulation in the Orwell hall were approved in principle. This will not be cheap. Work to improve the kitchens beneath the church is expected to be undertaken by Meals on Wheels at the end of October. Discussions are continuing on how best to deal with problems of damp and poor ventilation in the church, and to assess the urgency of maintenance work on the Wilhelmina Geddes window.

It was decided to hold a one-off **Christmas Fair** on **Saturday 19th November** both to raise money and contribute to the experience of fellowship by our members, and Armand Flack very kindly agreed to lead its organisation. **The next Committee meeting** will be on **Tuesday 11th October** at 8pm in the Fletcher Room.

### **1) Youth and Family**

We have been busy bees in Junior Church since we started back on the 11th of September. We have been working hard to tidy and replant our vegetable patch in the garden behind the Tennant Hall. We cut away and dug up all the weeds, put down new compost and so far we have planted onions and peas. Soon we will be adding garlic and rhubarb to the garden and we hope to have a nice crop in the springtime. We've also been planting bluebells and snowdrops around the base of the trees at the front of the church. The ground was tougher than expected and our trowel broke so we still have more to plant. We hope the bulbs will sprout in the springtime and will make the front car park look extra-beautiful! Starting from Sunday the 9th of October, we will be using Lego in Junior Church to help us learn more about Jesus and the Bible. Each week we will use Lego characters and pieces to make our own versions of stories from the Bible and we will take lots of pictures and maybe even make a few videos to show you what we create.

Also starting next Sunday we will be running our own Coder Dojo after church for the children and teenagers of Junior Church. Coder Dojo is an educational programme that teaches children to learn how to use computers and software in a variety of creative and fun ways. It will be running after church for 6 weeks in the youth and family area of the Tennant hall from 12.30 to 1.30. All children from 1st class up will be able to take part. We will keep you updated on what we get up to.

#### **Elevate and J-club**

Not only had Junior Church been busy, our youth clubs are starting back too. Elevate met yesterday for pizza and hanging out (what more could a teenager want?!) and J-club will start back next Saturday the 8th of October. Elevate will meet every second Saturday from now until Christmas in the Tennant hall from 7.15 - 9.15pm and is open to all young people in secondary school. J-club will be on every Saturday from 5.30 - 7.00pm also in the Tennant hall and it is open to all children in 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th class.
